
International Conferences on Native and Non-native Accents of English 'Accents'

Why Native AND Non-Native Accents?

The decision based on interests and discussions - some motivation points:

- Everybody speaks with an accent.
- Native and non-native accents: group and individual variability based on sociological, psychological and linguistic factors.
- Variability: greater in L2 than L1 accents (more variability sources),
 BUT the methods for L1 and L2 studies follow the same pattern:
 from native dialect (language) to a desired one.
- L2 Pronunciation Teaching: Not unlike accent reduction courses for native speakers
- L2 / L1 accent interplay: International English, ELF, Corporate English, attitudes to accents, ESL-EFL-ELF (ESOL) setting...

First 'Accents' – 3-5 December 2007

The conference continues the tradition of annual meetings of teachers and researchers in the area of phonetics and phonology of English in Poland. 


